The above map includes the Hudson Valley counties. Here is a capsule view of the SABR membership in New York City and its nearby environs as of 2023:

Awards for SABR Members

SABR Scholarships help members "learn, grow, and succeed through the award of monetary grants or participation in SABR events such as the Analytics Conference, Annual Convention, Jerry Malloy Negro League Conference, Frederick Ivor-Campbell 19th Century Base Ball Conference, and the Women in Baseball Conference." ** Negro Leagues Essay Contest

Qualifications: High School seniors.

Students write a 1,200-word essay answering a question related to one of the Negro League figures, who are the namesakes of the scholarship, with \$1,000 awarded as scholarships to high school seniors.

Deadline: Apply by mid-April 2025 (exact date of deadline to be announced).

** Women in Baseball Scholarship

Qualifications: High School seniors.

SABR's Women in Baseball Committee awards a scholarship in its Women in Baseball Essay Contest. Students write an essay of 1,500 words or less addressing the following question: "Choose one person or event in women's baseball history that you believe has made a significant impact on the game and explain the importance." (That question was for 2024's contest.) Deadline: The next application period will open in Spring 2025.

** Sarah Langs Women in Baseball Analytics Scholarship

Qualifications: female-identifying students or young professionals pursuing a career in baseball analytics and data science.

This scholarship provides meaningful professional development and networking opportunities and will pay for all registration fees and expenses associated with the 2025 SABR Analytics Conference in Phoenix, Arizona as well as registration for all courses in the online SABR Analytics Certification program.

Deadline: The next application period will open in Fall 2024.

** Yoseloff Scholarship—Jerry Malloy Negro League Conference

Qualifications: High School and College students.

With generous funding from The Nanar and Anthony Yoseloff Foundation, Inc., SABR will pay for all registration fees and expenses associated with the 2024 Jerry Malloy Negro League Conference in Cooperstown, New York conference for up to 4 students.

Deadline: Apply in April 2025 (exact date of deadline to be announced).

** Yoseloff Scholarship—SABR Analytics Conference

Qualifications: High School and College students.

With generous funding from The Nanar and Anthony Yoseloff Foundation, Inc., SABR will pay for all registration fees and expenses associated with the conference the 2025 SABR Analytics Conference in Phoenix, Arizona for up to 4 students.

Deadline: The next application period will open in Fall 2024.

** Yoseloff Scholarship—SABR 52

Qualifications: High School and College students hoping to attend the annual SABR national convention.

With generous funding from The Nanar and Anthony Yoseloff Foundation, Inc., SABR will pay for all registration fees and expenses associated with the national conference for up to 4 students. This year is SABR 52.

Deadline: Apply by mid-May (exact date of deadline to be announced).

The Ron Gabriel Award, given out by SABR's Casey Stengel Chapter in New York, honors the author(s) of the best research, published or unpublished, on the subject of the Brooklyn Dodgers completed during the preceding calendar year. Eligible works include but are not limited to magazine and journal articles, previously unpublished chapters or articles in anthologies or other books with multiple authors, unpublished research papers, written versions of oral presentations, books, databases and websites.

Ron Gabriel (1941-2009), a native of Brooklyn, New York, and longtime resident of Bethesda, Maryland, was a former Vice President of SABR and instrumental in establishing the Bob Davids Chapter, which serves the Washington-Baltimore region. He was founder and president of the Brooklyn Dodger Fan Club, and a charter elected member of the Brooklyn Dodger Hall of Fame. Gabriel, who earned his Ph.D. in Human Resource Management from American University, was a retired U.S. Government executive, having served with the Postal Service Management Institute, the Department of Defense and the General Services Administration.


We work with Caring Kind's *Connect2Baseball* program to engage the participants by watching short video clips, flipping old baseball cards, singing team songs, and sharing opinions on favorite teams, ballplayers, games, the Hall of Fame and really any baseball topic that comes up by anyone in the room! The goal is to elicit memories from the participants with early dementia.

We meet every 3rd Wednesday each month at 11 am in Manhattan, a block and a half from Grand Central. We laugh a lot, and the hour goes by too fast, but it is gratifying to chat about "anything baseball" in friendly ways. The room is large enough for a wide screen to view clips, and a table with water bottles and snacks, yet is cozy enough for our small group. Most of us know that he hit the game-winning homer in the only 2 World Series games that the Giants won in 1923, with the more thrilling HR happening in Game 1.



Ebbets Field Replica – Looking for a Home!




A hub for SABR research and activities to memorialize the anniversaries of important milestones in baseball history.

- Deadball Era Research Committee Encouraging research on baseball from 1901 to 1919.

- Nineteenth Century Research Committee Encouraging research on all facets of baseball before 1901.
- Official Scoring Research Committee
 Documenting the history and evolution of official scoring rules and who has done the scoring.
- Oral History Research Committee Recording and storing remembrances of baseball's past.
- Origins Research Committee
 Studying on the early forms of baseball and its predecessor games.
- Pictorial History Research Committee
 Cataloging and identifying photos of all major league players, managers, and ballparks.
- Science and Baseball Research Committee
 Exploring research in the science of baseball, including behavioral, physical, and natural sciences.
- Scouts Research Committee
 Compiling a complete roster of major league scouts and a listing of ballplayers they signed.
- Spring Training Research Committee Studying the impact of professional baseball on the cities which have played host to spring training camps.
- Statistical Analysis Research Committee
 Encouraging the exchange of research and analysis using baseball statistics.
- Umpires and Rules Research Committee Studying the impact of umpires and rules changes on the development of the game.
- Women in Baseball Research Committee
 Studying the role of women in various aspects of professional baseball.
